On a nice cool morning on Thursday May 18th, Kim and Tammy Keith lead the Texas Tour Participants on a caravan from DFW metro to Schulenburg. We started in Ferris near I-45 and quickly crossed over to Waxahachie to the Gambulos' Car Barn to meet with the rest of the crew. There were 9 cars and 17 Texas Regioners who made the trip. Kim and Tammy lead us down some good back roads to Waco where we did our first stop and had our first 'incident' – the Gambulos Caddy had a sticky starter. Fortunately, Charlie knew exactly what the problem was and after a couple of good whacks with a crowbar, we were all back on the road. We stopped in the Highway 77 Café just north of Rosebud for lunch, which had been recommended highly by Ira and Nuris Hester. Lynda Richardson had printed menus and called ahead with everyone's order, so they had both tables and food ready for us on arrival. The walls of the café are covered with photos of military and first responder's photos. From the Civil War to current. It started years ago with the owners putting up photos of their own relatives and soon regular customers asked if theirs could be added too. Now there are 613 photos on the wall and a listing available of the name, rank, service and date for all the photos. Quite the memorial to those who have served their country. The food was also quick, hot and good!






Other than the 'sticky starter' we arrived safely but tired in Schulenburg, where we were met in the lobby by our Crescent Region hosts with welcome packets and invitation to the Hospitality Room. We all dispersed into a caravan of all 80+ cars over to a nearby park for a well presented outdoor



hamburger and all the fixin's cookout. It was the first time we all got to see the cars together – and what a fine group of ancient to modern cars there were. It was a long day, so off to relax we all went.



The next morning was the traditional judging, at the host hotel, and though we didn't know it at the time, the Texas Region 'cleaned up' on awards. After judging we were off to our first tour – all 80+ cars – to visit our first Painted Church which the area is well known for. See Nuris' article about them, as they were well worth the drive to see these important memorials to Texas history. Then we caravanned again to Plum to visit a group of buildings housing a unique and private collection of vintage cars. The host building was in essence a parts store, where a Subway lunch was provided and the other buildings housed cars in various states – from roadside shell to pristine condition straight off of Mecham's auction block. It was like one of the late night commercials – you go through one building and thought you'd see it all – "But Wait! There's More!" and another building was just out the back door.





We all caravanned to Sengelmann Hall for dinner in downtown Schulenburg (at least 9 blocks away!). Built in 1894 the Hall is a lovely venue with a long history of drinking, dancing and gathering — which was the place that all approximately 150+ Texas Tour participants had dinner on Friday and Saturday evenings. It was a full hall, but with good food and quickly moving buffet we were all satisfied.



Saturday morning was off to another church and then on to Round Top. Unfortunately, Kim's Caddy decided not to start — with what was an apparent low battery. However, further Cole and Jerry investigation indicated that the alternator wasn't charging — so Kim was at risk driving anywhere. Texas Regioners are like Marines — "no man left behind". So the Claytons, Smiths, Richardsons and Hesters all followed Kim and Tammy to the O'Reillys in Schulenburg and after much investigation and head scratching, decided that a new battery and charging





line fuse was needed with a likely alternator replacement. While waiting for an alternator to arrive we all trooped down the street to a wonderful outside venue fresh food restaurant. 
2023 Texas Tour Award Winners


2023 Texas Tour Award Winners


For the love of God, Country and Art... the Painted Churches of Texas

It was a total delight to view three of the four Painted Churches of Texas in the Schulenburg area. Schulenburg is officially designated "Home of the Painted Churches" so it was fitting for the Golden Crescent Region to treat us to beautiful country roads (those less travelled but loved by all AACA members). We meandered down one lane roads some that seemed to cut

through homesteads and, not to be missed, all these grand old cars got to cross the famous Piano Bridge, so named because as you drive on it, it can sound like a roughly played piano. These amazing painted churches are the result of immigrants who loved God, wanted to recreate the majesty of beautiful worship centers and leave a legacy of their beloved countries and culture so a little piece of European grandeur is exhibited in each painted church.



Although the exterior of these churches may look like many other rural churches scattered about the American countryside, once you enter these painted churches, Ammannsville, Dubina, High Hill and Praha, you will come back with a sense of awe and wonder at how Czech and German communities in the late 1800s built small but very ornate and lovely churches with most-



Dubina church to the former glory as the original church of late 1800s was destroyed by a hurricane in 1909. A new church was rebuilt but it did not have the gorgeous paintings that gave the church its charm and elegance. Mr. Janecka spoke about the hardships of the immigrants endured and how he and his fellow Czech wanted to keep true to tradition, the beauty of loving God, Country and Art...which came together to make Dubina a beautiful paint-



ed church (see pictures). When the second church was built, much of the splendor was not replaced until Mr. Janecka along with a few others began to research what the original frescoes and painted structures looked like. After praying, Ed said he felt guided to paint the angels that are over the pillars in the church. The ceiling of this church is now a light blue with heavenly stars (six pointed like the Star of David). Without any background in art, Mr. Janecka has left his mark on

history in the angelic paintings of Dubina church. He also wrote a book you can purchase

entitled: Dubina, A Place of Freedom and Hope, which has a picture of him painting one of the angels.

The largest and oldest Painted church we visited was St. Mary's Church of Assumption in Praha built in 1895. The ceiling is lovely pale green with beautiful flowers and angels. The altar has an ornate gothic look to it much of it painted white with gold edging. Once a year in August they have a huge festival and conduct mass in Czech!

A few of us decided to visit a church that was not on the 69th TX Tour agenda but which we found out was actually named the "Queen of the Painted Churches" and it is High Hill church. The settlement of High Hill was Austri-

an-Moravian. This church had the most impressive stained-glass windows I've seen in any Texas church. The altar was less ornate than Praha but the elevated pulpit surrounded by small wooden



icons of the four synoptic gospel writers and with Jesus in the center were gorgeous as was the baptismal font (see pictures). We sat there enjoying the magnificent stained windows, paintings and wooden pillars that looked like marble columns in the cool of the day, and were filled with gratitude for the opportunity to see some the best of Texas and enjoy the nicest group of people from around all of Texas...AACA members!

ROUND TOP FESTIVAL INSTITUTE ——"A REAL GEM"! By Carey Frisby

The 2023 Texas Tour had lots of interesting stops, but none more interesting to Sue and I than the Round Top Festival Institute. It was really a surprise because we were focused on visiting the beautiful churches. The institute, founded by James Dick, is a destination for musically talented youth from all over the world. The selected musicians come for the summer to practice and perform under the tutelage of many famous directors and nationally recognized musicians. The young musicians live at the institute during their stay. Old houses had been bought and brought to the campus and completely rebuilt to provide lodging.

Our first stop on the guided tours was the concert hall. It is a masterpiece of wood working. No sound amplification is used during the concerts. The hall is completely constructed of wood and the décor



and ceiling, etc. are a complexity of angles. All construction was done by the in-house carpenter staff. There was also a chapel on the campus with beautiful stained glass and interior wood. The foundation and adjacent patio were fashioned by a local who used no mortar to build the walls and the stones were enormous. Quite a engineering accomplishment.

What started out as a dream of Mr. Dick, funded entirely by donations and good will, has evolved into a world class center for the performing arts.

They have well known artists giving performances from August to April each

year. During the summer months they have the student musicians give performances. It is a venue well worth a visit if you are in the area. Patrons from Houston and San Antonio flock to the performances according to our guide on the campus tour. Too bad it is not a little closer to North Texas.


Schulenburg AACA Meet,




