June Meeting Minutes

The meeting was called to order by Cole Clayton, president.

Cole reported that a good time was had by all that participated in the Texas Tour at Schulenburg.

There are five clubs that participate in this annual event. Next year, 2024, will be our club's turn to host the Texas Tour. He advised that different individuals head up different committees i.e. hospitality, tour planning, registration, etc. instead of a few individuals bearing all of the responsibility of the organization and facilitating the tour.

The treasurer's report was given by **Kaiden Lenners**, the treasurer. Expenses for Pate were \$800. This was under the budgeted amount of \$900. The fraudulent withdrawal of \$2000 of club funds from Frost Bank was denied by Frost. A complaint from the club about this matter has been sent to the Consumer Finance Protection Bureau (CFPB). They will have 10 business days to respond.

Cole stated that the directory was difficult to compile. Respondents to the annual questionnaire in regards to their cars, etc. are not always specific in their responses. It was requested that in the future members be clearer in regards to their personal information as well as to the information about their cars. There is consideration of making the directory only digitally accessible. The software currently being used is old and difficult to use. However, the coming year it will be printed.

Hank Crosby and his son, Henry, were introduced as returning members of the club. <u>New members</u>, Fernando Arroyo and Philip Speidel, were introduced. **Nuris Hester** introduced her brother, Shane Dennis, who was visiting from Puerto Rico.

Nuris Hester, Sunshine Chairperson, gave a report. It was noted that **Royce and Claudette Kidd** wanted to attend the meeting but Royce was not up to it.

Carey Frisby, Tour Director, announced that the Fall Tour would be in October. It will be in southeastern Oklahoma with the starting point in Denton. More specific details will be in the "Spotlight" as they are developed.

Cole reminded the membership that the Christmas meeting/party will be at the Brookhaven Country Club on December 3.

Nicole Gambulos noted that this will be the 55th anniversary of the BugTussle Trek. Lunch can not be provided at the **BugTussle Trek**. The reason is that there are no options for catering the lunch. The caterer used last year went out of business. The location for bringing your own lunch will either be at Bonham or Honey Grove. This is to be determined.

Nicole also gave an update on the plans for the **Texas Tour in Granbury, May 16-19, 2024**. There are two options for headquarter hotels. One would be the Hilton Gardens for \$179.00 a night. This would not include breakfast. It is adjacent to the conference center which is where some of the activities, including the banquet, will take place. It has adequate parking for cars and trailers. The other option is Comfort Suites for \$149.00. This includes a continental breakfast. There is adequate parking for cars and trailers across the street at the high school. There is a trolley that runs past the conference center. There was a vote from the membership which hotel option would be used for the Texas Tour, 2024. The majority voted for the Hilton Gardens. Tours which are being considered include Dublin, Glen Rose, a Comanche Peak nuclear plant tour, and some car museums in the area. It was also noted that Judy Kerr-Guysinger will be the treasurer for the event as she was the last time that the club hosted the Texas Tour.

Cole announced that the **July meeting will not be held at Ford's Garage**. The time would be too restrictive and the area which we could reserve is too small to accommodate our attendance numbers.

Clare Clayton held the drawing for door prizes. The winners were Kaiden Lenner, Nicole Gambulos, and Bill Newland.

The meeting was adjourned.

Lessons learned

On the way home from the fun tour to Wichita Falls in our 1949 Cadillac, Tammy and I experienced a small fire under the hood. A couple of wires burned up but no other damage was done. I pulled over, opened the hood and saw the flames. Quickly getting my fire extinguisher into service with two bursts the fire was out. The wires were still glowing so I gave it another burst but almost nothing came out. I cut the wires and disconnected the battery. Herein lies **the reason for this article**, { size matters }.

My fire extinguisher was made by Shield and tested by ULC { Underwriters Laboratories Canada }. The unit's classification is 1A-10B-C. It weighs 2.5 pounds and is rated for gasoline, diesel, metal,wood, plastic and electrical fires. The most important is the last letter C. This means the unit I frequently see with old cars is rated for only the smallest of auto, marine and household fires. If there had been any gasoline involved the glowing wires would have reignited the fire and at that point I could have only watched.

The letter C means a fire of no more than 10 square feet and the unit contains the equivalent of 1.2 gallons of water. I just assumed the contents of the unit would have lasted longer than it did. Now I know.

I have upgraded to a 5 pound unit and if I have a smaller one I'll always have two. Just subtract the cost of a larger unit from the value you place on your car and it will be worth it. Just food for thought.


