President's Report

They describe years where model T's and A's were once common. The trek is now dominated by more modern cars with air-conditioning. Others pointed out how the club's population was older now than in the past years, making it especially difficult for the seniors. Many others, old and young chose not to attend due to the 106F temperatures. The temperature prevented many from participating at all.

I was blessed this year that I had the opportunity to drive my 94 y/o dad, Phil Clayton and stepmom Sandy on the Trek in a modern air-conditioned truck. They spoke fondly of driving their 1920 Buick on previous Bugtussle's many years before. I had to wonder why the date of this event has not been adjusted to include more of our senior club members, and older cars we all love to see. At the next meeting, I will call for a vote to move the Bugtussle trek to the first or second week of October in 2024. The club members are the masters of the Bugtussle, the club can and will decide what date it occurs on. Please show up in large numbers at the next meeting and participate in the "October Bugtussle" vote. Whether you want to try to improve the event date or keep sweating on the hottest day of the year, please vote. You matter. This club serves you! It's up to you. Go Bug Tussle!

Rather than answer the questions about us and the non-Bugtussle Trek, I will give everyone a brief recap. Sue had volunteered us for early morning trek packet distribution on Saturday. We left early, about 6:00 AM for the 45 minute drive to Farmersville.

On Friday, when I went to the storage to get the Pontiac, it ran just long enough to get me out of the gate and short of a busy street. Dead battery! Sue came and I took out the battery, had it checked and the garage said, battery was bad. So, they gave me a new battery. Once installed the car ran fine, but the alternator voltage was a little low. I assumed it was because the new battery was charged. Bad assumption! The battery carried us to Farmersville and I managed to coast into the Chevrolet Dealership threading our way between commuter cars bound for their destination.

The dealership opened at 8:30 so we waited for awhile. The owner came and said their service department was not open on Saturdays. But, he had some workers coming in for lube service and his parts manager was due in around 9:00. So, we waited some more. One of the mechanics came out to help and we determined the alternator was bad, at least, it was not charging. The parts guy called the automotive places. No alternator in stock, would have to order and it would be the next week for delivery. These Chevrolet folks were really nice and helped all the could to get us to the trek.

Tow truck should be the answer. We had been paying for AAA for several years and yet to need them. So, I called AAA and their computer robot helped me place an order for a tow. No problem. The tow service was in the next town, Princeton, maybe 30 minutes away. ETA was 9:35AM. At 9:45 no tow truck, and no message from the tow company. I called AAA and could not get a live person. The robot was going to help me replace the order although "it" did not know "it" had already placed the same order.

Gave up, called the tow service direct. Never received out request from AAA. They could not call, we had to reorder the tow. My head was about to explode, but I tried AAA again. New robot, new name, "How can we help you today?" I hung up, called the tow service and said come get us and I will deal with AAA later.

Finally, tow truck arrives about 12:30.. Easy load, the Pontiac had enough juice to get up the truck ramp. Finally got home, unloaded the Pontiac and we both collapsed!

Monday morning I removed the alternator and took it down to Advanced Starter Service in Dallas. Because I had driven far, they repaired it while I waited. Cost was \$31 and change. These people, small operation, have done a lot of older car work. I wanted to keep the car original, but could have ordered a replacement easily from many outlets.

Next project before the Fall Tour, rebuild the headlight motor gears. Let' see now, where does that last screw go???? This wonderful Firebird has low mileage, but lotta years on the components!! However, it looks good, even sitting in the garage with the hood up!

AACA TEXAS REGION FALL TOUR

October 7th—Sunday October 8th

The AACA Texas Region Fall Tour will be a leisurely drive from North Texas to Hugo, Oklahoma via back roads departing from Buc-ee's on US 75, Exit 45, north of McKinney, Texas. Be ready to leave promptly at 9:30 AM. We will drive at 45 MPH, but as you know the cars at the end will be driving faster, so plan accordingly for which vehicle you will drive. The plan is to have two stops, the first at Bonham, at an Exxon station, about one hour after leaving Bucee's. The next stop will be about 75 miles to Boswell, Oklahoma at a nice Choctaw station. From there it is a short drive to Hugo and lunch at Angie's Circus City Diner. Total miles to Hugo from Buc-ee's is about 120 miles.

After lunch we will drive a short distance back through town to the Frisco Depot Museum which is a fascinating array of period items on the history of Hugo and the influence of the circus business and the railroad. Your tour package will include some information on the "Harvey Girls" which will also be well represented in the museum collection.

From the museum we will drive to Paris, Tx and the Holiday Inn for our overnight. At the Inn we will have Happy Hour at 5-6 PM, depending on our arrival time and check in. H Later, we will order in pizza and salads for a "stay in" dinner in the hospitality room. Water will be provided, so BYOB, be it soft or hard!

Note: Hotel Reservations need to be made by September 7 to get the good rate of \$98 (\$113.68 with tax).

Rate goes to \$129++ after that. Reservations **MUST** be cancelled by OCT 4 (72 hrs) or room will be charged to your credit card.


