

### Central Divisional Tour - The Runaway Scrape

### October 18-22, 2025

Registration is up for this four-day progressive tour starting at San Antonio and ending at the San Jacinto battleground.

Learn a bit about early Texian history as participants 'runaway' from Santa Ana's Mexican troops as we drive from San Antonio to Sequin, overnight at Gonzales and see the actual "Come and Take It Cannon".

Day Two, we stop in Shiner, Texas at the Spotzel Brewery for lunch then proceed to San Felipe, the first Anglo settlement in Tejas founded by Stephen F. Austin. Here, you'll learn WHY settlers came to Tejas and WHY Santa Ana was chasing them out. We then hustle northward to Brenham, Texas for respite.

Day Three after a morning stop at Blue Bell Creamery, we proceed to Washington-on-the-Brazos where the Texas Declaration of Independence was signed. After a catered lunch, we'll meander to New Caney, Tx to overnight and prepare to flee or fight.

Day four as we follow the (imaginary) beleaguered Texian army, we head south, taking the Lynchburg Ferry to San Jacinto and tour the sacred battlegrounds, museum, and monument. We end the tour at Monument Inn for our early afternoon banquet and afterwards depart home or to Galveston for the AACA National Fall Meet.

If you are not a Texan native, after this tour you'll understand why these events are so significant to the Texan culture, and to US history.
