prep for more FUN and good food at the Lamar County Historical Museum. So sit back and enjoy some
















Vehicle Make & Model 1974 Jaguar XKE Series III

What's influenced your interest in vintage/classic cars?

It started in Junior High with my first car – an old 1963 Ford Galaxy. At the time, pre WWII cars were popular as well as muscle cars. I upgraded to a 1969 Mustang Mk I in high school and college – that was a sweet car!

So how did you get into British vehicles?

I met my wife, Jan, twenty five years ago and she had a Jaguar Vanden Plas. Unfortunately, it was in a garage fire and was totaled. Jan loved Jaguars – I thought they were a 'rich man's car' and were out of my price range. However, I shopped around and found a 2003 S type (modern) and bought it. Then came the Jaguar XKR convertible, and we joined the Jaguar Owners Club of the Southwest. Jan won the Grand National Champion with the XKR V8 turbo charge. (The "R" stands for racing}). Anyways, since then, we've owned 13 Jaguars.

Ok, so what cars are in your stable now?

1957 Jaguar XK 140 FHC (fixed head coupe) 1954 XK120 (came with a Ford 351) 1967 Jaguar 420 1974 Jaguar E Type Series III 1998 Land Rover Defender 90 (most recent purchase in August 2025)

What's your favorite to drive?

Well, my favorite to drive is the 1957 KX 140 but my real love is, or was the E-type Series III V 12. [Ben was in an accident driving on BT Tour crossing Hwy 82 and was hit front left fender – knocked the bonnet clean off. Thank goodness Hagerty had a tow truck follow the tour! Ben and his grandson, Gibby, walked away from the incident, a bit shaken up and sore. The E-type not so good].

What's a fond memory you have with one of your vehicles?

Well, I was on my way (driving) the XKR to the National Concours meet in San Antonio and a rock hit my headlight lamp and shattered the glass. I couldn't put it in the show, but afterwards, purchased a replacement. The replacement had a black housing where the original had a silver housing. I showed that vehicle for two years and none of the judges caught that. I finally found an original silver replacement and swapped it out. I find that kinda humorous that these judges missed that!

Most memorable time in the vehicle.

When I finished restoring my Jaguar 420, I drove it for a couple of weddings and donned my chauffeur outfit: black suite, white shirt, and chaufferus hat. I had a blast driving the happy couple around and the photo shoots. The 420 is a classy, 4-door sedan vehicle with curvy lines.

I know you are active in several car clubs now that you are retired. Is this your new daytime job?

Pretty much so, yes. I've been serving as VP for the Jaguars Owners Association of North Texas for several years and have served in every position. Currently, I'm in charge of programming. I'm also a member of the "Jaguar E-type Car Club" as well as the Jaguar Enthusiast Club, both are UK based. Now, I'm a member of AACA, thanks to the Keig's. They told me how much fun they had on Bug Tussle last year, so we joined. It's great to see the variety of vehicles in the club. I'm also a Preservation Colonel in the Confederate Air Force, Red Bird airport. Our primary mission is to educate and preserve WWII vintage airplanes. Rolling Back the Years: The Henry Ford's Old Car Days By Nichole Gambulos

On a crisp September morning in Dearborn, Michigan, the sound of brass horns, the chuff of steam engines, and the faint whir of early electric motors drift through the air. The streets echo with the rattle of wooden-spoked wheels, and people wearing everything from straw boaters and vintage dresses to overalls and jeans walk in a slow pace past rows of gleaming automobiles that once defined the cutting edge of American innovation.

Welcome to the 74th annual Old Car Festival at Greenfield Village, better known among enthusiasts as "Old Car Days." Held every September since 1951, this beloved tradition is more than a car show — it's a living, breathing time machine, transporting visitors to the dawn of motoring. We've heard about this event for years but wondered could we really spend three solid days JUST at Greenfield Village and the Henry Ford? I think that after being there in May for the Thomas the Train weekend, we were going to be up to the challenge. There is no room for boredom at this place, only the will to keep walking and exploring. Our only limitations were a second grader and our wallets, so we carried forth.

We decided to fly in early on Thursday night, so we could be ready to view the cars as they started to arrive on Friday. It was a well-orchestrated machine and most of it was hidden but we were able to catch glimpses as we rode the train multiple loops around the Village itself. A bright red R.E.O. caught young Charles' eye and Charlie had to explain how they came about. The Village closed early on Friday, so that more cars could unload and maneuver safely without the crowds.

The next morning, the phrase "world's longest car parade" came to mind almost instantly. There were cars at our hotel, the historic Dearborn Inn and up and down the street leading to the Village. Every car was built between the 1890s and 1932 with gas powered roadsters and elegant electric runabouts leading the way. All were driven by some very proud owner puffed up and ready to answer questions about their unique vehicle as if they were presenting a speech in front of Congress. Small crowds would gather around a particular vehicle, especially if there was a costumed storyteller in the midst. It was challenging to get photos of some of the cars without too much background because there was a steady stream of enthusiastic onlookers!

We took turns looking at the cars as Charles was very excited about the huge playground and the potential to run amok with other kids. From my vantage point at the playground, I could still catch the gas lamp parade and the fire truck one. Trust me, you did not want to miss these events. We were at the Village from about 11 AM on Saturday through closing, having eaten all day walking around and checking out cars. In a rare moment alone, I was able to attend a lecture hosted by a Village historian about the financing of the various startups Henry Ford had prior to the actual launching of the Ford Motor Company.

One of the most surprising things to happen awaited us in the guest services building. We had crammed into that tiny little room to check in with lost and found when lo and behold who walks through the door while we are in line but fellow club members Judy Kerr-Guysinger and Neely Kerr! What were the chances?! We should have bought a lottery ticket after that! They were doing a road trip that involved seeing the Studebaker Museum but I'll let Judy tell her story at our next gathering. It was a fun surprise and we all kept running into each other throughout the event which added to the amusement to the day.

Beyond the cars though were many period reenactors, ragtime bands, historically inspired foods and carnival games galore. The atmosphere at dusk was straight out of the 1900s with Dixieland jazz music filling the air as headlights from another era twinkled up and down the street. We will go again next year, and we sure hope a few of you will join us for the 75th annual Old Car Festival!
